INVESTMENT PHILOSOPHY


The objective of the Moderately Aggressive Model is capital appreciation with current income as a secondary consideration. The interest rate and market value of the model will change in reaction to interest rates, government policies and worldwide economic conditions. The Moderately Aggressive Model allocates its assets to approximately 30% fixed income and 70% stocks. The asset classes are high-quality fixed income and stock funds. The fixed income portion consists of domestic and international mutual funds. The stock portion is diversified between value and growth, large and small, and domestic and international companies.
